

We move into the season of Advent at the very beginning of December (on December 1st). As in years past we will yearn for and prepare for the celebration of the birth of Jesus. We will also celebrate and yearn for Christ's appearance among us now and in the future.

Our Advent theme this year is "On the Way to Bethlehem", based on the book by Robert Fuguay and incorporating the materials from the Worship Design Studio (Marcia McFee). Here's a bit of an introduction to our theme:

We are so often focused on the destination in our travels. "Where are you going?" is the most common question upon hearing that someone is heading out of town. While the destination is perhaps the impetus for deciding to "go," it is often the journey itself that offers the most memorable moments -frustrating or delightful. This Advent season, we will pay attention not just to the destination of Christmas, but also to the places where events occurred that led to a starry night on which a child was born who would change the world. And we will ponder our own milestones-the progress and the potholes "on the way."

In our book study group on Monday afternoons (tentatively scheduled for 4 p.m.) and in worship we'll explore some of the stops along the way - Rome, Jerusalem, Nazareth and finally Bethlehem. In each of those places we'll explore the dynamics and impacts of those locations on the events approximately 2,000 years ago. As we accompany the biblical characters through the season, we will also explore our hearts and the ways we are longing for hope, joy, peace and love in our lives and in the world.

I pray that during the potential hustle and bustle of the season each one of us will find ways to attend to our spiritual journey as well. There's a devotional journal available in the Narthex and other devotional materials. Each Sunday we will be invited to look for the ways that God can take even the unexpected, unwanted and unholy and being new life - and Christ can be born among us and in us no matter where we are. The hope is that through this Advent journey we will be changed and go "home" in a way that is different from the start of the journey.

Here is Robert Fuguay's prayer as we start Advent together:

Dear Lord, may I become more aware this season of the journey of my life. Help me to see and discover you as my Guide. As I make my way to Christmas, may I step aside from the daily destinations of life to consider where my journey is ultimately taking me and where you want to lead me. Help me to be open to sights and stops you want to show me as I go, so that when I arrive at Christmas, I will be at a new starting point of my journey. Amen.

"Red Book" Memories Continued XXVII

"Provisions for the Journey"

We have begun a new, yet old journey into our congregation's future. It's old in the sense that we are a faith community devoted to God and seeking to live out the mission of Jesus Christ through the guidance of the Holy Spirit. It's a new journey because we will be working to do those very things in an everchanging, unfolding world. We will need provisions.

In order to be true to our God-given work and to our church's history, we will need to address two important questions. How do we respect and learn from the past? What things are worth preserving and how? Answering the first question is relatively easy. It's the second one that will challenge us.

How do we respect and learn from the past? First, we continue to examine our congregation's historical records and listen to the story of our church, its pastors, and its people. We must do so with an eye on the previous times and circumstances in which our faith community functioned. There are messages from our earliest days, when Lewisburg was named Derrstown and it was more a frontier settlement than a quiet borough within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And let us not forget what can be learned from the times when our church endured and thrived during the American Civil War, two World Wars, the Great Depression of 1929, the societal turmoil of the 1960s, and several regional conflicts overseas. The people around us, as well our nation, required much of our church. How did we do it and still remain faithful to God, Jesus, and our mission to serve? The answers, which can guide us into the future, reside in the documents of our past, along with the memories of some of our long-term congregants. These must be preserved and studied. That will be one of the provisions we need for the journey ahead.

What things are worth preserving and how? As was noted in last month's "Red Book Memories Continued" article, we have always valued inspiring worship services enhanced by music, quality Christian education, hospitality, congregational generosity, active mission and service to our neighbors, and skilled pastors. We must continue to preserve these aspects of our congregational life since they define and nourish who we are as a church. These are other provisions for our journey. But how do we do that?

The Wisdom Teacher of Ecclesiastes writes, "There is a time to look for something and a time to consider it lost. There is a time to keep things and a time to throw things away" (Ecclesiastes 3:6, ERV). To preserve the best of who we are for our future work and continuation as a faith community, we must adapt to changing times and embrace new ways of being a church, a lesson we can learn from our past.

Recall from previous "Red Book" articles, that during the mid-1800s, our ancestral congregations changed from German worship services to ones that were fully English-language. This was done to meet the growing needs of those attracted to and attending our church. When the format of our worship services or our congregational hymnals were no longer spiritually fulfilling or aligned with changing denominational affiliations, we adopted new ones. When our building facilities could not handle what was asked of them for worship, mission, or community outreach, we renovated or completely rebuilt them. And when technology changed and made it possible to connect with our members and others in new ways, we embraced it. For example, during the pastorate of Rev. Perry Smith, we purchased and starting using a mimeograph in 1938. This led to the first publishing of worship bulletins and congregational newsletters. We went on from there to make use of advanced copying machines and telephone systems, as well as projectors and DVD players. We obtained video recorders for the distribution of taped worship services to shut-ins and others. Now, we broadcast our worship to members and others through various social media platforms. Without a doubt, the capacity to discern what is useful or not, a willingness to change, and adaptability, are other important provisions we will need.

We have embarked on a new, yet old journey. We have the provisions we need: a history to study, values that define who we are, and the ability to change and adapt to our circumstances. Armed with faith in God, the mission Jesus gave us, the guidance of the Spirit, and a belief in ourselves and each other, let us take those first steps into the good tomorrow the Holy One is preparing for St. John's!
