"Red Book" Memories Continued XXVIII

"Through Thick and Thin"

Throughout the history of St. John's, our ancestral congregants enjoyed times of prosperity and peace. They also endured periods of economic hardship and rationing due to war, which required careful and creative use of resources, as well as flexibility. Our congregation's capacity to deal with times both "thick and thin," are clearly reflected in our church's cookbooks.

We currently have three cookbooks in our archives, published by our church in 1940, 1947, and 2004. Each contains recipes contributed by church members. It's fascinating to look through them, especially when it comes to seeing how some recipes have remained the same over the years while others have markedly changed. It's also interesting to find recipes in the older cookbooks that you won't find in later ones.

For example, all three cookbooks have recipes for Banana Bread that are remarkably the same, no matter the year of the cookbook. All call for mashed bananas, sugar, shortening, flour, salt, and other familiar ingredients. The amount of sugar used remains the same. Further, each recipe requires a baking time of about an hour and at a temperature of 350° F.

However, the earlier 1940 and 1947 cookbooks have recipes unique to the times when they were written, ones of rationing, shortages, and uncontrolled high food costs. In those publications, you will find recipes for "Butterless, Eggless, and Milkless Cake." The primary ingredients were brown sugar, raisins, citron, shortening, flour, baking powder, and assorted commonly available spices, like cinnamon and cloves. There are also recipes for "Eggless Cookies" (which used minimal flour) and a "Graham Roll," made from Graham Crackers, dates, walnuts, and marshmallows. One other recipe that deserves attention is "Shredded Wheat Pudding," made with easily obtained Shredded Wheat biscuits, along with two eggs, molasses, and milk. It is just one of a number of pudding recipes found in the earlier cookbooks.

The 1940 and 1947 cookbooks also offered a number of casserole recipes that made use of beef, pork, cheese, and noodles. These foods were readily available, locally. Most call for the inclusion of milk and toppings of bread or cracker crumbs. These ingredients were added to increase the number of servings in a casserole and to make them more filling. What a practical way to stretch food and grocery money!

Something else found in the 1940 and 1947 St. John's cookbooks, that does not appear in the latest one, are recipes for making cough syrup and hand lotion. The cough syrup was made from "horehound tea," lemons, licorice, brown sugar, and rock candy. "Tragacanth," glycerin, and water were used for making the hand lotion. Why purchase a remedy that might be costly and unavailable, when you could make your own?

Our 2004 cookbook, written during a time of relative prosperity compared to the earlier books, is very different. It features recipes that make use of a variety of meats, vegetables, grains, and other ingredients. This is demonstrated by the recipes provided for haddock fillets, scallops, salmon, and tofu. Except for a couple of canned salmon recipes, none of those other ingredients appeared in the 1940 and 1947 cookbooks.

Regardless of when the cookbooks were written, the recipes provided were designed to make use of available resources. and to produce meals that were nutritious, filling, and satisfying. They reflect careful thought and creativity, as well as flexibility and adaptability. No doubt, that same kind of practical approach during times of "thick and thin" was applied to the resources of people, money, and goods available to the congregation of St. John's. It allowed our church to prosper and meet the needs of its members, as well as the people our faith community has touched over the years, despite times of scarcity. Let us always remember the example set by the authors of our cookbooks and use it to carry us into the future, as we continue to be faithful to God and our Lord, Jesus.

Those St. John's Reformed Dishes

Some church members may remember the St. John's Reformed dinnerware that the church has owned for many years. We have about 100 place settings—dinner plate, salad plate, cup, and saucer, along with various serving items such as gravy pitchers and platters. Our best guess is that this dinnerware was purchased for church dinners 80-100 years ago. In recent years, we have rarely used the place settings because they are very heavy. We also have located 34 plates commemorating St. John's 150th anniversary. We will not have space for any of these items in the renovated kitchen. We have preserved one place setting of the dinnerware and one of the commemorative plates in a glass-front cabinet in the narthex. We plan to keep some of the serving pieces.



The Kitchen Renovation Committee would like to make place settings of the St. John's Reformed place dinnerware available to members of the congregation, along with the commemorative plates. There is no charge, but you are welcome to donate to the Kitchen Refurnishing Fund. We will look for a way to pass the rest of the place settings along to people who can use them. In fact, several place settings have already been donated to a refugee family new to the area.

The Kitchen Refurnishing Fund

The Consistory of St. John's UCC has authorized setting up a fund called the Kitchen Refurnishing Fund, to be operative throughout 2025. We are looking forward to having a licensed kitchen, which means that as much cooking gear as possible should be washed in the commercial dishwasher. At present, many of the pots and baking pans are aluminum and cannot go through the commercial dishwasher. Additionally, many utensils such as cooking spoons and spatulas are either aluminum or have plastic, resin, or wooden parts, and they cannot go through the dishwasher. We are looking to replace these items with stainless steel versions. The Kitchen Renovation Committee is developing a "wish list" of needed items for refurnishing the kitchen, and we will provide that information in the next newsletter. The items that we can no longer use will go to agencies or people who can use them.

SUMMER YOUTH LUNCH PROGRAM (SYLP): APPEAL FOR FUNDS

The program has been in existence for nearly a decade and works with, and through the Union County Food Bank, now at the UPC church on Rt. 192. Its purpose is to cover the gap during the summer vacation for families with school-age children who would, during term time, receive free school lunches. From June through August, SYLP distributes extra bags of food, including milk, cheese, bread and ham, to eligible clients at the food bank. As you probably know, each twice-monthly distribution is managed by volunteers from one of the six participating churches. In recent years the number of clients and the price of food that we buy from the Central PA Food Bank in Williamsport has steadily risen. Last summer, SYLP distributed 277 bags of food to 188 families with 481 children at a total cost of \$3707.00. We are expecting numbers and costs fo the next summer to be comparable or slightly hight, but we are running out of funds. At present we have promisies for about hall the \$4000 we are going to need. SYLP has always appreciated the sterling service given by church volunteers, without hom the program could not exist-but, now, we need extra funding as well and have turned first to those whose support we've always relied on. Any contribution, great or small, will be gratefully received!
