## How are you doing?

When you receive this newsletter, we will likely be a few days away from a national election. We have experienced so much divisiveness in our nation. If you watch

TV the political ads don't seem to stop and each one contradicts the last one. It is hard to avoid the anxiety and distress around this upcoming election.

It's not just the election that divides peoples these days. There are ideological divides in denominations, nations, institutions and many other areas of our lives. The tension is palpable and impacts us as groups and as individuals.

While there are no easy answers, there are some things we can do to be about the work of reconciliation even in a time of discord. For us, as people of faith, it begins with recognizing our priorities that take us above any of the divides we may experience as humans. In a recent "meme" on social media there's a quote that says, "no matter who you see, you can be certain that God loves them." That's a good starting point. If God loves the person that I am talking to (and God does) who am I to do anything other than love them - translation - treat them with respect as a child of God.

That sounds lovely, but there's a step beyond "looking at them" and what we might be thinking about our understandings of a person, but then we might engage in conversation with a person (or be in a situation in which we have to share in conversation). How do we do so and maintain our respect and love as we talk across the divide?

In a recent article in Christian Century, it tells of a retired social worker who has never "felt at home in any ... camp". He described his situation as one in which he felt very torn - almost like being split in half. "I didn't want to reject them [people he loved who thought differently] and everything that was near and dear to them. But I also wanted to make my way and was drawn to pursue social justice." This can be a difficult and exhausting place to find ourselves.

The author of the article tells about several efforts to move across the divide. One is called "Untying Knots an initiative to bring communications workshops to Catholic and Protestant churches, colleges and retreat centers." An important premise in their work is abandoning the immediate desire to convert people to our opinion. Another important observation is that we can work side-by-side with people who think, worship and vote differently than we do. The founder says, "The first service we owe to others is in learning to listen to them. The ministry of healing is committed to us by God, who is the great listener."

Another effort is called the "People's Supper" a weekly meal designed for neighbors to come together and talk about things that concerned them. Over time, it became obvious that political differences threatened to destroy the gathering and make it impossible for them to continue in their weekly gatherings. On one night the leader said, "There's no ignoring we're not in agreement about what we hope for [in a particular election]. We have this dinner every week, but let's figure out how we want to move through this." As the group talked about things they "decided to put their phones away, share a normal dinner and watch the election together, acknowledging in advance that no matter the outcome, some would be pleased, others devastated."

The People's Supper founder, K Scarry, believes that relationships can be maintained across differences if "both [all] participants can grow in self-awareness of their own emotional responses."

There are many ways to enter into difficult conversations - of course starting with respect for all as God's children, a willingness to check our own emotional responses. Another tool is being willing to be curious about how someone else "holds together" Leah Sargeant, founder of "Braver Angels" says it 'makes sense to map the other side's viewpoint before trying to knock it down - asking "Why do you think this?" She notes that [some] might be on the same side of an issue but for different reasons, which also matter."

My prayer for each one is that we can move through this season with grace, humor and a desire for healing and reconciliation; with all of this being infused with a deep belief that God's love is greater than any human difference. In response to differences with others, we are to "love them, respect them, and seek to understand where they are coming from." This is not easy work, but it is important work and is a fundamental part of our identity as followers of Jesus, whose ministry was about love for all of humanity. "Let us not grow weary in doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up" Galatians 6:9.

"Continuous Celebration"

Celebrate and be glad forever! I am creating a Jerusalem, full of happy people.

– Isaiah 65:18 (CEV)

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Our congregation's special commemorative worship service on the afternoon of October 20<sup>th</sup>, as well as the catered dinner that followed, officially marked the end of our eight-month-long bicentennial observance. However, that doesn't mean that our celebrations have finished. There will still be some "unofficial" activities, including the filling and burial of a congregational time capsule and the publication of a special, illustrated collection of my "Red Book" articles from over the years, which will include information about our bicentennial events. But even then, our celebrations should not conclude.

Psychologists have found that celebrating helps us to be appreciative of our blessings and more hopeful when things seem uncertain. What's more, celebrating works to build our capacity to be resilient and enhances our overall wellbeing. These are vital resources we will need to draw upon as we build our church's future. Our ongoing celebration should manifest itself in how we continue to function as a church.

As I have noted in my previous "Red Book" articles, we have a history of inspiring worship and music ministries. These have enhanced our congregational life and fellowship, drawing those who hear or participate in them into a deeper experience of God and Jesus. Our worship and music have also promoted spiritual growth.

We have a history of quality Christian education, not only through classroom lessons, but also by participation in the full life of the church, mission projects, and community outreach. These activities have taught us how to live and act in the world as disciples of Jesus the Christ. Additionally, our Christian education opportunities have deepened and nourished our faith.

We have a history of congregational generosity and of encouraging church members to give of their time, talents, and resources in support of the life of our faith community. Our worship services, Christian education efforts, church administration, and facility upkeep, as well as church dinners and community outreach, have all benefited from this aspect of our congregational life.

We have a history of hospitality. It has been demonstrated by intentional acts of invitation and community service. These have not only been directed toward its members and related families, but also individuals in the wider community. All are welcome at St. John's.

#### Important Congregational Meetings about a Proposal to Renovate the Kitchen

On Sunday, Nov. 10, There will be an informational meeting for the congregation about the proposed kitchen renovation immediately after the church service, with a congregational vote to be held on Sunday, Nov. 17, after the service. Since early 2024, a Kitchen Renovation Committee composed of Linda Sartwell, Penny Cooper, Dee Ledgerwood, Todd Hummel, Sue Tomlinson, Alice Rauch, and Ann Smit (chair) has considered issues with the church kitchen, including:

a partially working gas stove and non-working ovens an old and energy-inefficient refrigerator and a freezer that is too small non-working electrical outlets in the countertops damaged and dated cabinetry

Additionally, the kitchen does not meet current codes, due to lack of a dedicated hand-washing sink, lack of a fire suppression system in the hood, and lack of a wheelchair-accessible sink and counter.

The committee considered at length how the kitchen could be used over the next 35 years, given St. John's own needs and its long-standing commitment to serving the community. Because of the scope of the issues, the Committee engaged a consultant to assist in updating the kitchen to meet future needs and to bring it up to code.

The committee decided to switch to electrical appliances when replacing the gas stove and ovens, primarily for reasons of safety and energy efficiency. The consultant urged them to keep the existing commercial dishwasher, the commercial hood, the triple sinks, and the wooden shelving in the storage closet, all of which are still in good working order, which helps to keep costs down. At the same time, the total costs for the renovation are substantial, as they include several new and energy-efficient commercial appliances, new cabinetry, new waterproof flooring, a hood fire-suppression system, engineering costs, construction costs, and costs related to a building permit.

The proposed renovation plan has been approved by the Building and Grounds Committee, the Finance, Stewardship, and Personnel Committee, and the Consistory. St. John's has a Building Fund - Phase II that can only be used to expand or improve the building. This fund was created by generous donors when the present church was built in 1990, and it has accrued a very substantial amount of interest over the years. The Finance Committee recommends using some of this money for the kitchen renovation.

Both the informational meeting and the vote will be held in the sanctuary immediately after the church service. They will be available to members who join via Facebook or YouTube. Information about how to vote will be provided.
