I had the blessing of attending a recent training on ZOOM. It was a training to learn more about “Spirituality in Nature Groups” (SING) and how different congregations and ministries have participated in different kinds of activities in the outdoors

Part of the training and material reminded those participating in the benefits of being outside and in the presence of God’s creation. According to the material from the training, there are any number of reasons why it is beneficial to spend time in nature, including:

*Satisfying the human yearning for quiet and rest

*The health benefits of nature, including lowered blood pressure, lessened anxiety and depression, and increased physical health.

*In addition, spending time outdoors encourages compassion for both humans and non-humans alike. It reaffirms our interdependence and interconnectedness with all living things and restores our place in the web of Creation.

These benefits are undergirded by the spiritual reminders that “nature was the first way in which God made God’s self known - through the provision of the earth, through the burning bush, through living waters. ... people reflect time and time again that they feel closer to the Divine when they are out in nature.”

As the season changes into autumn, the days become shorter, and we spend more time indoors, I am challenging myself and all of us to spend some time outdoors and to not forget the benefits of spending moments outside - being present in God’s Creation.

Happy Autumn, blessed new season ... may you find places of quiet and rest - and spiritual nourishment, whether indoors or outdoors.

“Red Book” Memories Continued XXV

“Rooted in tradition, progressive in our outlook”

“Rooted in tradition, progressive in our outlook.” That is the theme adopted by our leadership for St. John’s for 2024, to orient and guide us as we celebrate 200 years of serving God, Jesus, and the people around us. It is very apt, as I hope you will agree, because it is something that has been apparent in past “Red Book Memories” articles.

We have certainly been a church grounded in tradition. When we began as a German Reformed congregation in 1824, we followed that institution faithfully until 1934, when through a denominational merger, we became an Evangelical and Reformed (E&R) church. We then rooted ourselves in that faith tradition until 1961, when once again, through denominational merger, we grew into a United Church of Christ (UCC) congregation. We have firmly remained a UCC faith community to this day.

We have demonstrated our rootedness in tradition through the upkeep of our buildings and grounds. As years passed, church members identified issues with our facilities and raised the necessary money for repairs and upgrades. They also either hired the necessary people to do the required work or did it themselves. All of this was done to maintain and sustain an environment that nurtured the St. John’s faith community.

We continued to embrace traditions even after changes in our denominational affiliations. We maintained previously accepted governance structures, worship styles, and hymnals through those transitions and for a time afterwards. What’s more, we followed other traditions over the years that go beyond denominational shifts and how we function and worship. Here, I am thinking of our long-term tradition of Sunday Christian Education classes for children, youths, and adults. Those have been part of our congregational life since nearly our beginning as a faith community. And let us not forget the past tradition of hosting our own Vacation Bible Schools or participating in ecumenical community Vacation Bible Schools.

Over our long history, we have also maintained the traditions of calling quality pastors to serve us, having vocal and instrumental choirs to enhance our worship, reaching out to the surrounding community through public dinners and service projects, and providing support of different mission efforts. Just think about how we have given “White Gifts” for residents of Bethany Homes these past 80 years or sponsored Christmas parties for adults with special needs at Selinsgrove Center since the mid-1950s.

Yet, we have also been progressive in our outlook. For instance, during the pastorate of Rev. Samuel H. Reed (1842-1843), when our services were performed in German, our church experimented with English language sermons to meet the needs of non-German speaking residents of Lewisburg. Likewise, when we changed affiliations, we eventually shed some of our previous traditions and adopted new ones in terms of worship and governance that conformed with our new denominational identity. We learned to use new hymnals, sing new songs, to speak of our faith with updated language, and to meet the changing needs of people around us. Consider that our worship services, which were previously in-person only, were taped and shared with home-bound members, and are now broadcast through social media platforms, thus making Worship and the Word available to individuals at any time, a real benefit for those who want to be a part of a church, but face the realities of work and other obligations on Sunday mornings.

Further, we have been progressive in our outlook in regards to our church buildings. When they outlived their ability to serve our future needs or that of the people of Lewisburg, we have been bold and either completely rebuilt our facilities or established them elsewhere. That took vision and a devotion to God, Jesus, and the mission our Lord has challenged us to fulfill.

Yes, we have been rooted in the tradition, which has nourished our faith and given us an identity. But we have also been progressive in our outlook, ready to do whatever was necessary to enact our faith in an everchanging world. Tradition and progressive outlook are in our lifeblood. Let us take both to heart. Together, they will serve our church well in the years and decades yet to unfold.

Earlier this year, we kicked-off our bicentennial celebration with the creation of special logos by Dot Bower and Riley Hoey. These adorn selected clothing and other items made in honor of this milestone occasion. Some have already been sold and delivered to members. But, if you missed the chance to get these 200th Anniversary keepsakes, they will again be advertised for purchase at a later date.

In March, our months-long celebration began in earnest with the hanging of a beautiful 200th Anniversary quilt in our Narthex. It was lovingly made by one of the St. John's Quilters, Knitters and Knotters. This was followed by our Sunday, March 10th, worship service, which featured a special, thought-provoking sermon offered by Penn Central Conference Minister, Rev. Dr. Carrie Call, followed by a delicious congregational meal. In June we had a music festival featuring different musical groups who call St. John's home! In July there was an old-fashioned picnic with plenty of delicious food and fun games.

As our 200th Anniversary year progresses, you will continue to have so much more to look forward to. In our final months, we will focus on a other aspects of our congregational life. That schedule includes:

October – Celebration of our church pastors, church leaders, and spiritual children

Additionally, there is one event you should certainly mark on your calendar to attend:

October 20th – 3 PM Worshipful Celebration of St. John's, followed at 5 PM by a **FREE** catered congregational dinner at the Silver Moon Banquet Hall in Lewisburg.

St. John's is 200 years old! Be sure to come and celebrate this wonderful milestone with your church family as events are offered. It's a once-in-a-lifetime experience!

CONGRATULATIONS!.... from Pat and I to the members of St. John's United Church of Christ on your 200th anniversary.

My parents Rev. Paul and Adele Jordan had the very fortunate experience of serving St. John's from 1956-1969. Much of that time my mother was the choir director.

I vividly recall that both of the Sunday morning services were full and many times the overflow doors of the sanctuary were open. My parents often mentioned that this ministry was an exciting ministry. The members were fantastic as there were the Brouses, the Webers, the Golds, the O'Neals and the Grovers. And who could ever forget Eddie Spots, a devote Catholic who would go to early mass and then somewhat late come to St John's to hear my father at the second service. He would limp down the aisle and take a second row seat...almost as if the service could now start. And there were so many more in the church that made this ministry a very important ministry within my parents life.

My father along with the Baptist minister started the all town New Year's Eve bash at Davis Gym at Bucknell with the 1st one highlighting Little Richard. And then when you put Rev. Thomas Musser of the West Milton, UCC, Rev. Merritt of the Lewisburg Presbyterian Church and the Lewisburg Baptist minister plus the other town ministers together it was a dynamic time of spirituality in Lewisburg.

My father was very interested in establishing a historical society of St. Johns and to that end several years ago I sent about a dozen of his sermons to be placed in your historical archives. I trust they were received, possibly even looked at occasionally, and placed with other important aspects of St. John's history as a tribute to your past. His sermons were biblically based and thoughtful for one's faith and everyday life.

St. John's was and is a vital church and as you move into the next hundred years may that excitement found within the Christian faith infiltrate the hearts, souls and prayers of each member.

Pat and I cannot be present at your celebration but we do wish you a sincere 200th.
